# 03

## Introduction

The annual survey of school leavers undertaken by Careers Wales on behalf of the Welsh Assembly Government, continues to provide a useful snapshot of pupil destinations which informs careers staff in their work with clients, parents, teachers and employers. The data collected also proves an invaluable aid to partners and colleagues involved in planning learning, training and employment opportunities.

- Destinations data was collected as at 31 October 2007.
- Definitions. Most headings on the tables are self-explanatory. However, the following may assist readers:
  - **“Work Based Training – non employed status”**: This includes all Government supported work based training without employed status.
  - **“Work Based Training – employed status”**: This includes Modern Apprenticeships and other Government supported training of employees.
  - **“WBTP”**: Work Based Training for Young People.
- **“Known not to be in education, training or employment”**: This includes those unavailable and those registered with Careers Companies as unemployed.
- **“Left the area”**: Those who are known to have left the area but not necessarily Wales.
- In some instances percentages may have been rounded up or down and may not always total 100%.
- National figures may mask variances at careers company, local authority and institution level across all cohorts.

# Year 11 Summary

06

- 39,396 Year 11 pupils completed statutory education in 2007.
- 51.0% (20,108) were male and 49.0% (19,288) were female.
- The majority of the cohort 84.5 % (33,273 individuals) went into some form of continued learning in full-time education or work-based training, representing 81.8 % of the male and 87.2% of the female pupils.
- The greatest number, 77.2% of the cohort (30,405 individuals), continued in full time education. A higher percentage of females (almost 10 percentage points more) chose this route than males.
- 53.8% of those continuing in full-time education (16,373 individuals), continued their education in a school sixth form and 46.2% continued at a further education college (14, 032 individuals).
- 11.7% of the cohort (4,594 individuals) entered the labour market either going into employment or work based training. Considerably more males (Over 7 percentage points more) than females entered the labour market.
- 5.2% (2,064 individuals) entered work based training non-employed status. A higher percentage of males (over two percentage points more) than females chose this route.
- 2.0% (804 individuals) entered work based training with employed status. This route was the least popular for both genders but proved more popular with boys, with 3.1% of males and 1.0% of females choosing this route.
- 4.4% (1,726 individuals) entered employment outside Government supported training. Just over twice as many boys than girls chose this route.
- On the survey date 6.9% of the cohort (2,707 individuals) were known not to be in any form of education, training or employment. A higher percentage of males than females fall into this category.
- 59.8% of the total figures of those known not to be in any form of education, training or employment were registered with Careers Wales and 29.9% were not. There was a higher percentage of Males than females in both instances. 279 individuals were unable to enter employment, education or WBTP due to illness, pregnancy etc. Considerably more females than males fall into this category (over 10 percentage points more).
- There was no response from 2.4% of the cohort (931 individuals).
- 1.9% (759 individuals) were shown to have left their local area – but not necessarily Wales.

# Year 11 Summary by ethnicity

- Ethnic data and analysis may be slightly skewed by the fact that 6.3 % of the Year 11 cohort did not supply information on ethnicity.
- Of those returning information on ethnicity:
  - The most popular choice of route across all groups was continuing in full time education.
  - A higher percentage of those in minority ethnic groups (almost 7 percentage points more) continued in full time education than those who are white.
  - A smaller percentage of those in minority ethnic groups entered work based training than those who are white.
  - A higher percentage (almost 3 percentage points) of those who are white entered employment other.
  - The least popular route for all groups was work based training employed status.

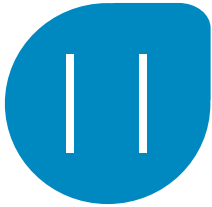

# Year 12 Summary

- There were 16,114 pupils in the Year 12 cohort in 2007.
- 46.4% (7,477 individuals) were male and 53.6% (8,637 individuals) were female.
- The majority of the cohort 89.4% (14,412 individuals) went into some form of continued learning in full-time education or work-based training, representing 88.0% of the male and 90.7% of the female pupils.
- The greatest proportion, 87.0% of the cohort (14,019 individuals), continued in full time education.
- 87.5% of those continuing in full-time education (12,260 individuals), continued their education in a school sixth form and 12.5% continued at a further education college (1,759 individuals).
- 7.0% of the cohort (1,122 individuals) entered the labour market, either going into employment or work based training; a higher percentage of males than females chose to enter the labour market.
- 1.7% (271 individuals) entered work based training non-employed status. Similar percentages of males and females chose this route.

## Year 12 Summary (continued)

- 0.8% (122 individuals) entered work based training with employed status. This route was the least popular for both genders but proved slightly more popular with boys.
- 4.5% (729 individuals) entered employment outside Government supported training. A slightly higher percentage of males than females chose this route.
- On the survey date 3.3% of the cohort (524 individuals) were known not to be in any form of education, training or employment. A slightly higher percentage of males than females fall into this category.
- 34.0% of the total figures of those known not to be in any form of education, training or employment were registered with Careers Wales and 52.1% were not. There was a higher percentage of males than females in both instances. 73 individuals were unable to enter employment, education or WBTP due to illness, pregnancy etc. Considerably more females than males fall into this category (over 18 percentage points more).
- There was no response from 2.1% of the cohort (344 individuals).
- 0.6% (105 individuals) were shown to have left their local area – but not necessarily Wales.

# Year 13 Summary

Figures are for students in the second year of a school sixth form, normally aged 17 or 18.

- 11,950 pupils completed Year 13 in 2007.
- 45.9% (5,482) were male and 54.1% (6,468) were female.
- The majority, 80.9% of the cohort (9,670 individuals) went into some form of continued learning in education or work-based training; More females 81.9% than Males 79.8% took this option.
- 79.7% (9,525 individuals) continued in full-time education. A higher percentage (three percentage points more) of females than males were in this category.
- The majority of those continuing in education, 75.2% (7,159 individuals) progressed on to higher education this represents 59.9% of the total cohort.
- Of those continuing in education, a higher percentage (almost 3 percentage points more) of females progressed to higher education than males; representing 62.0% of the total female cohort and 57.5% of the total male cohort.
- Of those continuing in education 8.3% (788 individuals) continued their education in a school sixth form and 8.7% (828 individuals) continued at a further education college. A higher percentage of boys (over one percentage point more) than girls continued to Year 14 in a sixth form.
- 7.9% of those continuing in education (750 individuals) stated they were taking a gap year with the intention of going on to higher education the following year. 29.7% stated they were doing this for reasons of personal development, 34.5% stating the reason as financial to fund probable entry to HE the following year and the remaining 35.7% stating a combination of both reasons.



## Year 13 Summary (continued)

- 11.7% of the cohort (1,401 individuals) entered the labour market either going into employment or work based training.
- A small number 0.3% of the cohort (33 individuals) entered work-based training without employed status. This route was the least popular for both girls and boys.
- 0.9% (112 individuals) entered work-based training with employed status. A slightly higher percentage of males are in this category.
- 10.5% (1,256 individuals) entered employment outside Government supported training. A slightly higher percentage of males than females are in this category.
- 4.6% of the cohort (549 individuals) were known not to be in any form of education, training or employment. A higher percentage of males than females fell into this category.
- 12.0% of the total figures of those known not to be in any form of education, training or employment were registered with Careers Wales and 74.5% were not. There was a higher percentage of males than females in both instances. 74 individuals were unable to enter employment, education or WBTYP due to illness, pregnancy etc. Considerably more females than males fell into this category (over 10 percentage points more).
- There was no response from 3.0% of the cohort (363 individuals).
- 0.9% (112 individuals) were shown to have left their local area – but not necessarily Wales.

## Year 13 Summary by ethnicity

- Ethnic data and analysis may be slightly skewed by the fact that 6.2% of the Year 13 cohort did not supply information on ethnicity.
- Of those returning information on ethnicity:
  - The most popular choice of route across all groups was continuing in full time education.
  - A higher percentage of those from minority ethnic groups (three percentage points more) than those who are white continued in full time education.
  - A higher percentage of those from minority ethnic groups did not respond to the survey or had left the area.
  - The least popular route for those from those who are white was work based training non employed status, and the least popular route for those from ethnic minority groups was work based training employed status.

# Trends

- For the whole of the five year period recorded here, the most popular destination for the majority of young people in all three cohorts is to continue with their education full time.
- The percentage of the Year 12 and Year 13 cohorts continuing in full time education is maintained this year. The Year 11 cohort however, records almost a two percentage point rise on 2006.
- There has been a slight fall this year in the percentage of young people expected to go from Year 13 to higher education, 66.2% of the total cohort, compared with 67.1% in 2006 (figures include those taking a gap year).
- The percentage of those taking a gap year has increased slightly by one percentage point.
- The percentage of young people entering employment outside government supported training programmes is maintained this year for the Year 11, 12 and 13 cohort.
- The percentage of pupils falling into the known not to be in education, training or employment category has risen fractionally for the Year 11 and 12 cohort this year. Figures in this category for Year 13 are slightly lower than 2006.
- Gender differences continue to follow a similar pattern over the five year period recorded here:
  - The percentage of boys entering the labour market, either work based training or employment, continues to be higher than the number of girls across the three cohorts.
  - As in previous years, a larger proportion of girls than boys choose to continue in full time education. The difference is most marked in Year 11 with over nine percentage points more girls than boys choosing this route. This year records a slight raise (almost two percentage points) in the percentage of girls in Year 11 choosing this route. The trend for boys was maintained in years 11 and 13, while it slightly went down in year 12.
  - There continues to be a higher percentage of boys than girls in the known not to be in education, training or employment category. The difference continues to be most marked in the Year 11 cohort with almost two percentage points more boys in this category.
- The percentage of pupils in Year 11 and 12 who are recorded as having left their local area have decreased slightly this year – these young people have not necessarily left Wales. Figures for Year 13 have increased slightly this year.
