Introduction

This report gives details of the destinations of 14,823 pupils who completed years 11, 12 and 13 in the summer of 2010. It relates to all secondary schools across Carmarthenshire, Neath Port Talbot, Pembrokeshire, Swansea and Ceredigion. Pupils from special schools are included in the survey but those from colleges and independent schools are not.

The survey is conducted by **Careers Wales West** on behalf of the Welsh Assembly Government and records each pupil's known activity on the **31st of October 2010**.

Destinations are analysed by gender, ethnic origin and local authority. Where possible, comparisons are given with previous years' destinations.

Key Findings

- 83% of 16 year olds in West Wales stayed on in full-time education in 2010.
- 8% of 16 year olds entered work-based training compared to 7% in 2009. The majority of clients entered work-based training without employed status (7%). More young men (7%) than women (6%) chose this training route.
- As in 2009, 2% of school leavers went straight into employment. More young males (3%) chose this option, compared to young females (1%).
- 4% of school leavers were known not to be in employment, education or training (NEET), compared to 5% in 2009. 57% of those who are NEET are registered with Careers Wales West.
- As in previous years, more young women stayed on in full-time education while a higher number of young men chose employment or training. Many of those going into work and training made stereotypical choices. Young men favoured Construction, Armed Forces and Vehicle Trades. While young women preferred Hair & Beauty or Child Care occupations.
- The 'No Response' rate, after at least three attempts at contacting clients, has fallen again this year to 0.45%. This figure was 0.6% in 2009 and 1% in 2008. This continual improvement demonstrates our effort and commitment to improving our systems for 'keeping in touch'.
- 62% of year 13 pupils entered Higher Education in 2010. Compared to 63% in 2009 and 64% in 2008.
- 1% of Year 13 pupils decided to take a 'gap year' before going onto Higher Education in 2010 compared to 2% in 2009 and 5% in 2008. This figure has decreased steadily since 2006 (7%).
- 66% of Year 13 pupils entering Higher Education chose to go to university in Wales. Compared to 71% in 2009.
- Ethnic Minority groups make up 3% of the year 11 cohort, 4% of the year 12 cohort and 5% of the year 13 cohort. Of the year 11 cohort 87% chose to stay in full-time education.

Explanation Of Terms

The following terms will be referred to throughout this publication:

Full-Time Education

Includes young people who continue to follow academic and/or vocational courses at school or Further Education College.

Work Based Training (WBT)

Work Based Training is a government sponsored training programme. This includes Skill Build and Apprenticeships.

Work Based Training – Non Employed Status

Young people who may be on the above programme and who are in receipt of a training allowance.

Work Based Training – Employed Status

Young people who may be on a WBT programme but who also have a contract of employment.

Employed

Young people who have a contract of employment but who are not involved in government sponsored training.

Not in Education, Employment or Training (NEET)

These clients include:

- Those **registered** with Careers Wales West for support to find a placement in education, employment or training.
- Those available for education, employment or training but who are **not registered** with Careers Wales West.
- Those not available for education, employment or training (e.g. pregnancy, custodial sentence, ill health, carer).

Unknown

- **No Response** – Did not respond to enquiries, including telephone calls and letters.
- **Moved from area** – No longer in the company area.

Higher Education

Study beyond secondary level at an institution of higher education or college of further education.

Gap Year

Those who have applied for a higher education course and formally deferred via UCAS.

Education

- In 2010, 83% of 16 year olds stayed on in full-time education in West Wales.
- More young women (86%) than young men (81%) chose to continue in full-time education beyond the statutory school leaving age in 2010.
- 47% of pupils chose to continue their education at college compared to 36% who remained at school.

Employment & Training

- 8% of school leavers chose to move on to Work-Based Training compared to 7% in 2009. More males (9%) than females (6%) chose this route.

- 2% went straight into employment. More males (3%) chose this option than females (1%).

NEET

- 4% were not known to be in employment, education or training. Compared to 5% in 2009.

Unknown

- The 'No Response' rate, after at least three attempts at contacting the client was less than 1% again this year.

Education

- Again this year there has been an increase in the amount of 16 year olds who chose to stay in full-time education (87%). This compares to 86% in 2009 and 82% in 2008.
- More young women (89%) than young men (85%) chose to continue in full-time education beyond the statutory school leaving age in 2010. The number of young men choosing to remain in full-time education has risen by 2% since 2009 and 6% since 2008.
- 47% of pupils chose to continue their education at college compared to 40% who remained at school.

Employment & Training

- 7% of school leavers chose to move on to Work-Based Training. More young men (8%) chose this option than

young women (5%). An increase of 1% for both males and females since 2009.

- As in 2009, 2% entered employment in Carmarthenshire. More males (2%) chose this option than females (1%).

NEET

- 3% were not known to be in employment, education or training. Compared to 4% in 2009.

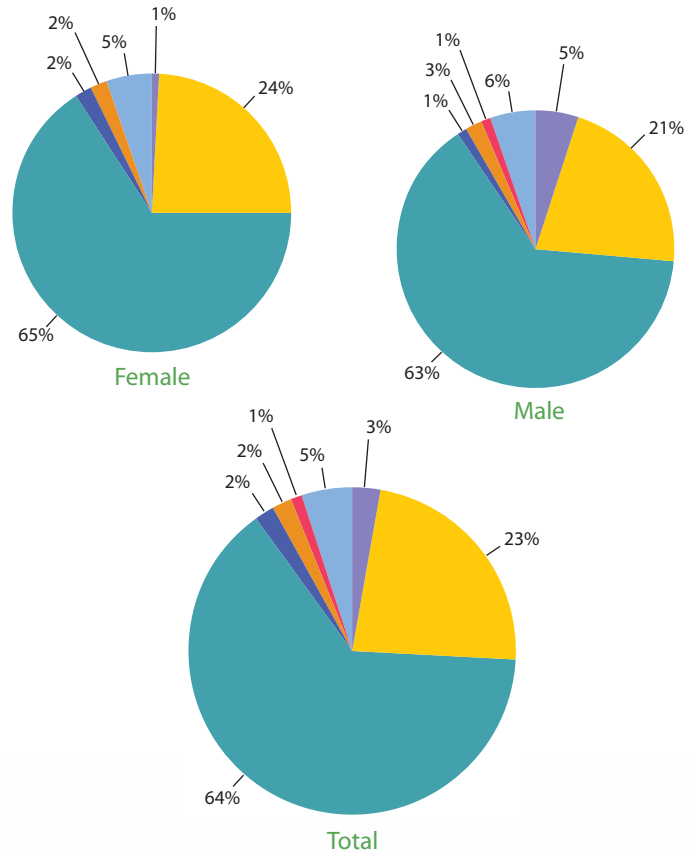

Education

- 87% of 16 year olds chose to stay in full-time education in 2010. An increase of 1% since 2009.
- More young women (89%) than young men (84%) chose to continue in full-time education beyond the statutory school leaving age in 2010. The number of young men choosing to remain in full-time education has risen by 2% since 2009 and 6% since 2008.
- 23% of pupils chose to continue their education at college compared to 64% who remained at school.

Employment & Training

- 6% of school leavers chose to move on to Work-Based Training compared to 5% in 2009. More young men (7%) chose this option than young women (5%).

- As in 2009, 3% entered employment in Ceredigion. More males (5%) chose this option than females (1%).

NEET

- As in 2009, 2% were not known to be in employment, education or Training.

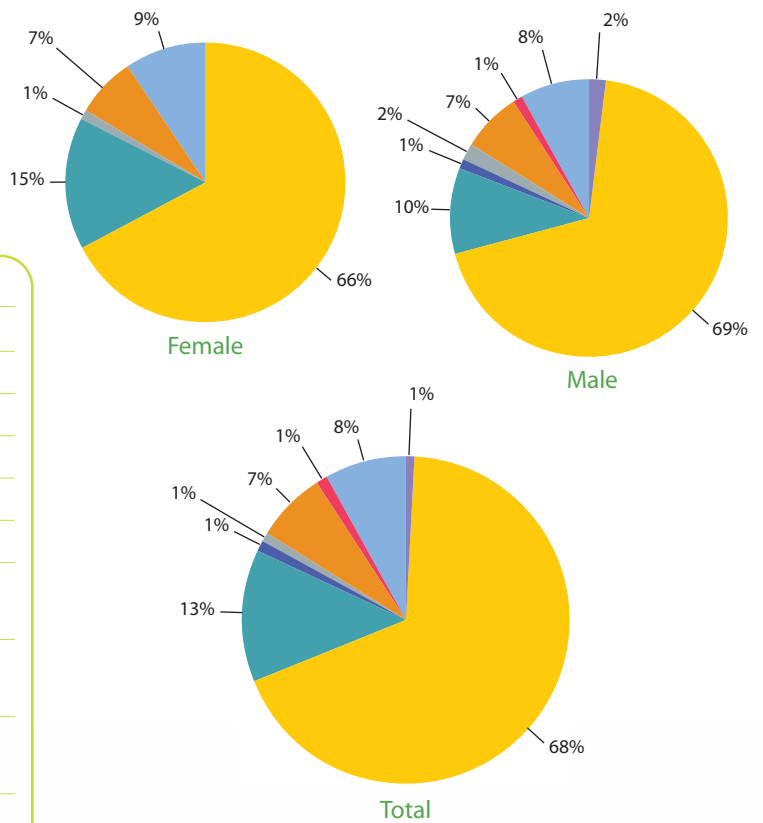

Education

- 81% of 16 year olds chose to stay in full-time education in 2010.
- 81% of young women and 79% of young men chose to continue in full-time education beyond the statutory school leaving age in 2010.
- 68% of pupils chose to continue their education at college compared to 13% who remained at school.

Employment & Training

- As in 2009, 9% of school leavers chose to move on to Work-Based Training in 2010. 9% of males chose Work-Based Training in 2010, as did 9% of females. With slightly more males securing WBT-Employed Status.

- 1% entered employment in Neath Port Talbot. More males chose this option than females.

NEET

- As in 2009, 7% were not known to be in employment, education or training.

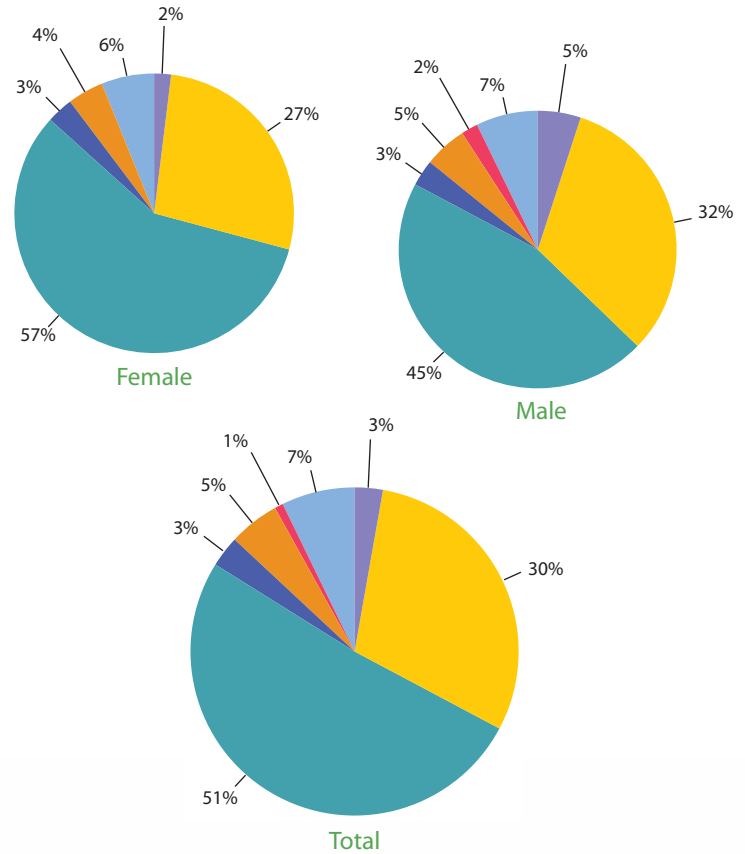

Education

- 81% of 16 year olds chose to stay in full-time education in 2010. Compared to 85% in 2009.
- More young women (84%) than young men (77%) chose to continue in full-time education beyond the statutory school leaving age. Figures have decreased for both genders in 2010 but the decrease is more significant for males (6%).
- 30% of pupils chose to continue their education at college compared to 51% who remained at school.

Employment & Training

- The numbers of school leavers who chose to move on to Work-Based Training in 2010 has increased by 2% from

last year. The figure now stands at 8%. More young men choose this option (9%) than young women (6%).

- 3% entered employment in Pembrokeshire this year compared to 2% in 2009. More males (5%) chose this option than females (2%).

NEET

- As in 2009, 5% were not known to be in employment, education or training.

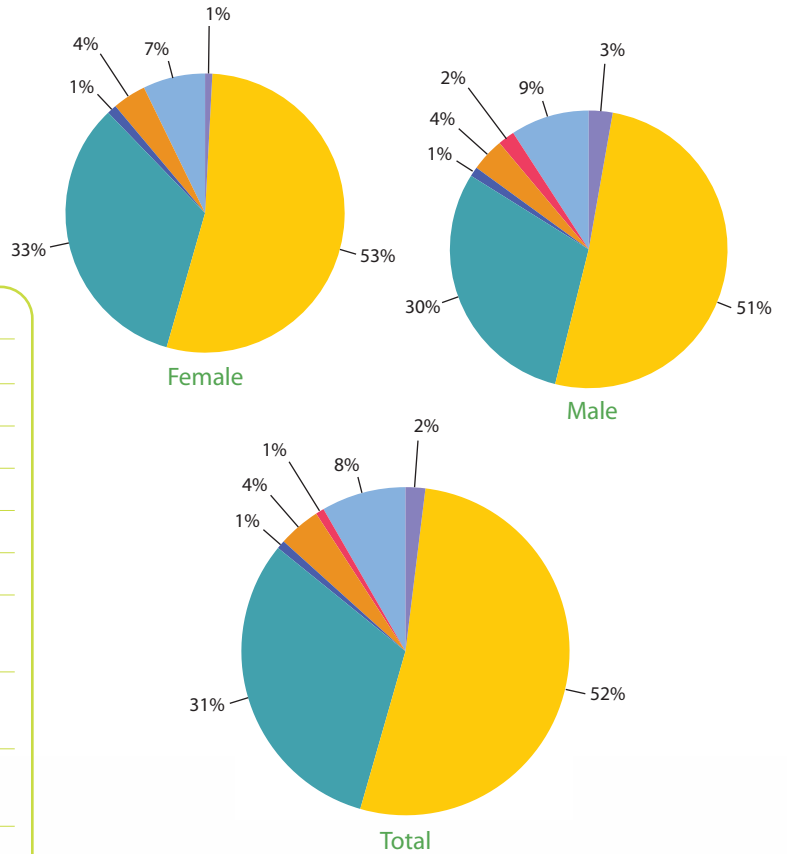

Education

- 83% of 16 year olds chose to continue in full-time education beyond the statutory school leaving age in 2010. Compared to 81% in 2009.
- More young women (86%) than young men (81%) chose to continue in full-time education.
- 52% of pupils chose to continue their education at college compared to 31% who remained at school.

Employment & Training

- As in 2009, 9% of school leavers chose to move on to Work-Based Training in 2010. With more males (11%) choosing this option than females (7%).

- As in 2009, 2% entered employment in Swansea. More males (3%) chose this option than females (1%).

NEET

- Those that were not known to be in employment, education or training has decreased again this year to 4%.

Unknown

- The 'No Response' rate, after at least three attempts at contacting the client was 0%. Highlighting the continued efforts made by Careers Wales West to 'keep in touch' with our clients.

- Young people from ethnic minority backgrounds make up 3% of the year 11 cohort. This is an increase of 0.5% since 2009.
- Of these clients, 87% returned to full time education compared to 84% of the year 11 cohort as a whole.
- Of all the Unitary Authorities, Swansea has the highest concentration of ethnic minority clients as recorded on our Management Information System. This is also the case for Years 12 and 13.

- Of these clients, 92% returned to full time education compared to 91% of the year 12 cohort as a whole.

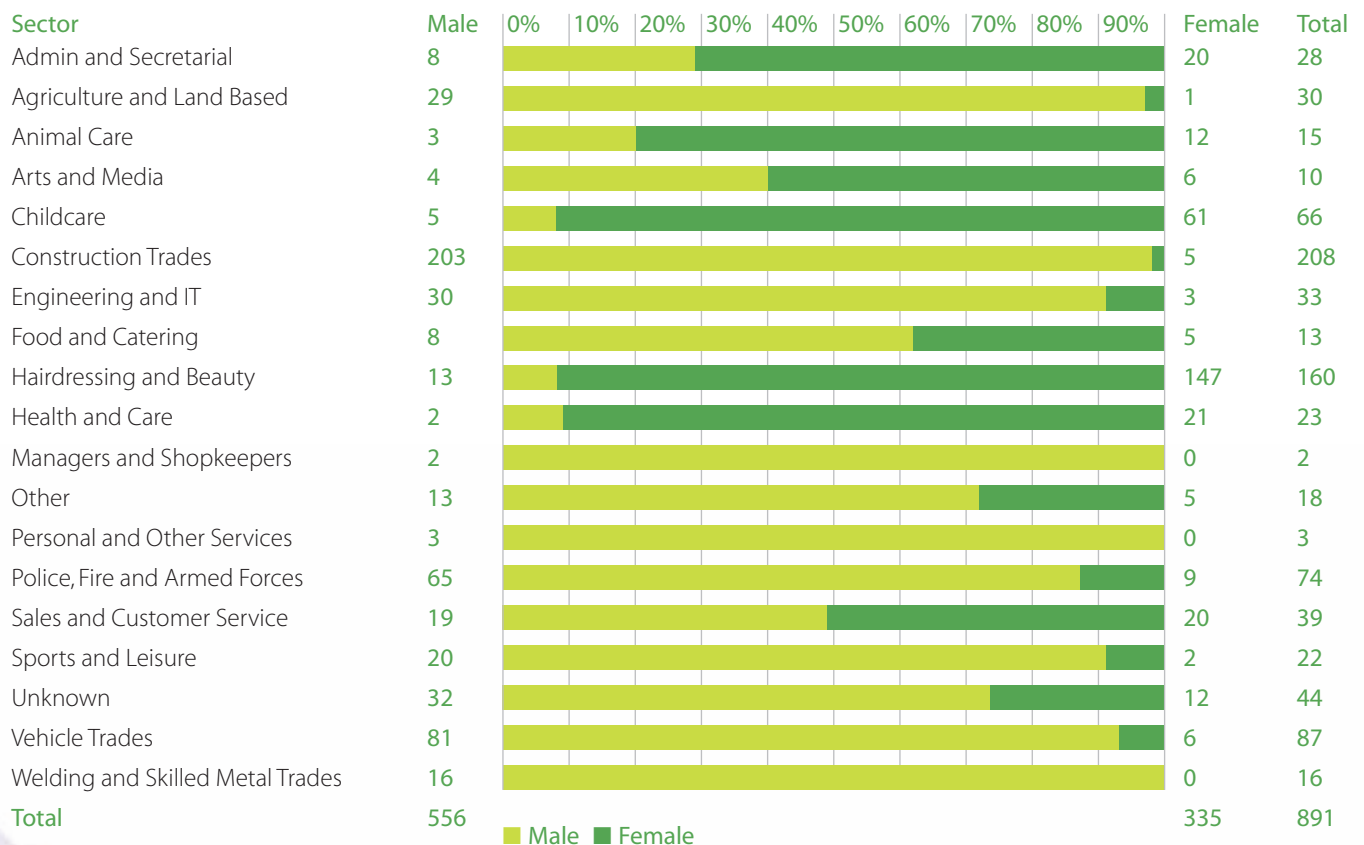

- Young people from ethnic minority backgrounds make up 5% of the year 13 cohort. This figure compares to 3.9% in 2009.
- Of these clients, 83% returned to full time education compared to 80% of the year 13 cohort as a whole.

Occupational routes of school leavers entering employment or WBT in West Wales

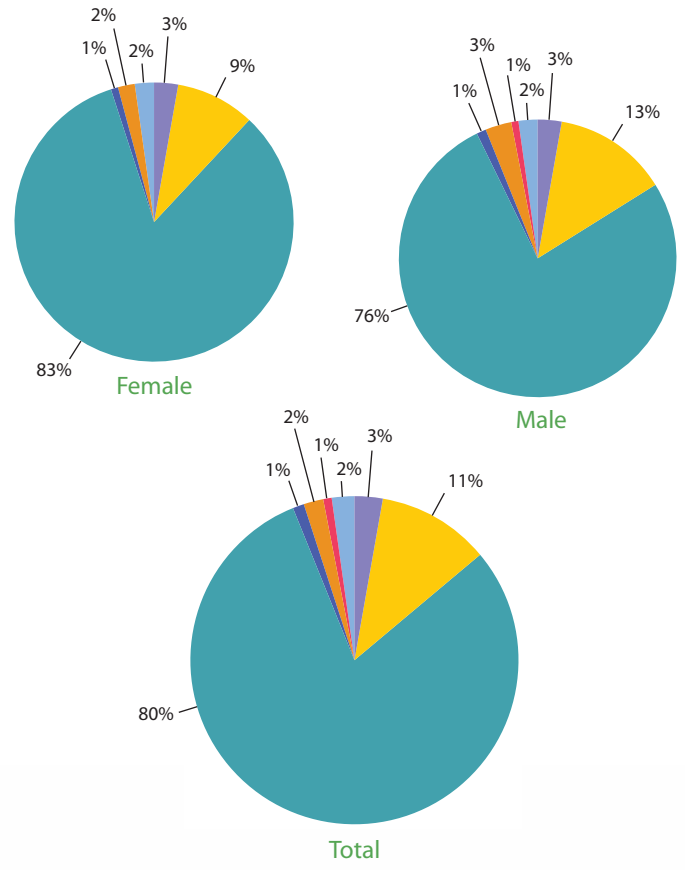


- 10% of school leavers entered employment or work based training in 2010. Compared to 9% in 2009 and 12% in 2008.
- 12% of males and 7% of females chose employment and work based training. The number of males choosing this option has fallen again this year by 1% since 2009. More significantly, by 5% since 2008 and 7% since 2007.

- As in previous years, construction and hairdressing and beauty remain the most popular routes for those entering employment and work-based training at 16.
- Stereotypical choices continue to be made by young people when moving on to employment and work-based training. Males continue to pursue Construction and Vehicle Trades and females continue to pursue Hairdressing and Beauty and Childcare.

Education

- 91% of Year 12 continued in full-time education in 2010, compared to 94% in 2009.
- 92% of females and 89% of males chose to stay in education in 2010. This is a 3% decrease for females and a 4% decrease for males since 2009.
- 80% of year 12 students continued their education at school, whilst 11% moved on to college.

Employment & Training

- 3% of pupils entered direct employment in 2010. Compared to 2% in 2009.
- 3% entered WBT compared to 1% in 2009.

NEET

- 2% of pupils were not known to be in employment, education or training.

Unknown

- The 'No Response' rate, after at least three attempts at contacting the client was less than 1%. Again highlighting the continued efforts made by Careers Wales West to 'keep in touch' with our clients.

Education

- 62% of Year 13 pupils entered Higher Education in 2010. Compared to 63% in 2009 and 64% in 2008. More young women (66%) than young men (57%) chose this option. There has been a decrease of 2% of males entering Higher Education since 2009.
- 1% of pupils took a 'Gap Year' in 2010. Compared to 2% in 2009 and 5% in 2008.

Employment & Training

- 11% of pupils entered direct employment in 2010. Compared to 9% in 2009 and 10% in 2008. Only 1% of pupils entered WBT.

NEET

- 6% of pupils were not known to be in employment, education or training.

Unknown

- The 'No Response' rate, after at least three attempts at contacting the client was 1%.
